Historic Ferris House

The historic Ferris House or Mariemont M Museum at 3915 Plainville Road, Mariemont, was the scene of the 50th anniversary party of the Mariemont Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. Leonard Stringfield, Regent of the Chapter, said the celebration held there at 3:00 p.m. on May 17, was fortunate to be in the same house as the first meeting held on May 24, 1930.

In addition to the members, there were several invited guests which included Mr. Clarence Erickson, Mayor of Mariemont, and his wife; Mrs. Walter Langsam, Regent of the Cincinnati DAR Chapter; Mrs. Todd Fenwick, Regent of Clough Valley Chapter DAR; Miss Doris Penrod, Regent of Indian Hill Chapter DAR; Mrs. Ann Kitzmiller, Regent of Ohio State DAR; Mrs. Donal Blair, Vice Regent, Ohio State DAR; and Mrs. Wendell Chaney. Southwest District Director DAR. Two members of the original Mariemont Chapter, but who later resigned, were invited also - Mrs. Paul Kreider and Mrs. A. Ronsheim.

Mrs. Cleveland Sticksell, Daisy to her many friends, was especially honored as she has been a member of the Mariemont Chapter ever since its organization fifty years ago. During those fifty years, she has served twice as Regent as well as local and state chairman of the conservation committee. Ten members also received recognition as having been members of the Daughters of the American Revolution for twenty-five years or more.

The Mariemont Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution came into being as a result of a suggestion by Charles J. Livingood, one time President of the Thomas Emery Company and President of the Mariemont Company. Mr. Livingood was responsible for carrying out Mrs. Mary Emery's ideas for the building of the English village of Mariemont, the ideal community.

Mrs. Ross McElroy was chairman of the committee for the anniversary party; Mrs. Leonard Stringfield, the Regent, was in charge of the program; Mrs. Ralph Jones read the history of the Mariemont Chapter; Mrs. Harry Binder was in charge of the guest book; and Miss Gertrude Addicott, ex Regent, greeted the guests.

Members of the Mariemont Chapter DAR who live in the village are Miss Gertrude Addicott, Mrs. Earl Barnes, Mrs. Harry Cain, Mrs. Robert Fagely, Mrs. Samuel McCarthy, Mrs. Ross McElroy, Mrs. Leonard Stringfield, and Mrs. J.K. Billingsly.

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The idea of marking a highway began in Missouri about 1909 when a group of women formed a committee to locate the Old Santa Fe Trail in Missouri. This committee was influential in securing an appropriation from the state of Missouri to mark the trail with suitable boulders or monuments.

This idea further developed into plans for a highway to be designated as the National Old Trails Road, by Act of Congress, and the work of marking was carried on in conjunction with the National Old Trails Road Association.

In 1911, the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution established a national committee known as the National Old Trails Road Committee whose work was, primarily, to definitely establish the Old Trails Road as a great National Memorial Highway.

In 1912, the National Old Trails Road Association came into being and stated in its bylaws: "The object of the Association shall be to assist the Daughters of the American Revolution in marking Old Trails and to promote the construction of an Ocean-to-Ocean Highway of modern type worthy of its memorial character." The Association, under the guidance of its president Harry S. Truman, guaranteed the expense of erecting the monuments.

In 1924, the plan for the proposed monument was changed from a small cast iron marker on the Trails to a new plan which involved the erection of 12 large markers. In 1927, the proposed design—"The Madonna of the Trail," was accepted by the Daughters of the American Revolution's 36th Continental Congress.

"The Madonna of the Trail" is a pioneer woman clasping her baby with her young son clinging to her skirts. The face of the mother, strong in character, beauty and gentleness, is the face of a mother who realizes her responsibilities and trusts in God. It has feeling of solidity-a monument which will stand throug the ages.

The figure of the mother is of heroic proportions—10 feet hig with a weight of 5 tons. The base on which the figure stands i 6 feet high and weighs 12 tons. This base rests on a foundation which stands 2 feet above ground level which makes the monument 18 feet tall.

The figure and the base are made of algonite stone (a poured mass), of which Missouri granite is the main aggregate, thus giving the monuments a warm, pink shade which is the color o Missouri native granite. It was expected that this stone had admirable aging qualities and, with time, would improve it color and solidity.

On the two sides of the base are found mention of historic data or local commemoration. These inscriptions are of the Revolutionary period or of early history in the respective localities.

These monuments were erected in each of the 12 states through which the National Old Trails Road passes. The monument was designed and sculpted by August Leimbach of St. Louis. The idea for the design was suggested by Mrs. John Trigg Moss, chairman of the DAR national committee.

At Bethesda, Maryland, in the week of April 19, 1929, the twelfth of the series of monuments erected by state organizations of the Daughters of the American Revolution was dedicated, to mark the Ocean-to-Ocean Highway in honor of the pioneer mothers of the covered wagon days.

This completed the memorialization of the trail of a young nation as they traveled across the Allegheny Mountains to make their homes in the great western wilderness. "The autograph of a Nation written across the face of a continent."

DAR connecting with the military

USAF Majors Jeffrey Simmons and Matthew Wallace, both anesthesiologists and participants in C-STARS CCATT, presented an informational program to the Mariemont DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution) at the Barn, Women's Cultural and Art Center, on March 17.

The presentation included information regarding the Critical Care Air Transport Team crucial to saving wounded personnel in Iraq and Afghanistan through immediate air transport to Germany or the US, saving lives that might otherwise have been lost. Major Simmons and Major Wallace are a part of the joint program between the Air Force and the University Hospital Cincinnati Trauma Center designed to offer training for military medical personnel in the areas of trauma and critical care by working side by side with civilian colleagues to treat trauma and critical care patients. A simulation lab is a major part of this training. In addition to information regarding the program, Majors Simmons and Wallace also shared personal experiences from time spent in Afghanistan and insights into the terrain in the areas of Afghanistan in which our soldiers are involved.

Support of military personnel and veterans is a very important mission of the Daughters of the American Revoluton.

Mariemont Chapter of DAR continues to collect toiletries, lap robes, and personal care items for the local VA hospital as well as to support deployed service people.
